## Living out Faith in the Home

The following is a set of recommendations given to the parents of kids who are returning home after being at Steppin' Stones home for troubled girls. Obviously, each home is unique, but it seems that the home for troubled teens might see some common denominators with the families of many of the girls.

Generally speaking, what can the parents of troubled teens do to help their kids? Or in other words, what picture does this paint of the family dynamics?

Do these things relate to the parents of 2-year-olds as well?

# WHEN YOUR DAUGHTER COMES HOME:

#### WHAT NOT TO DO

- Don't rescue by blaming others for your daughter's behavior.
- Don't make decisions based on the short look: keeping the peace, for convenience, or because of guilt.
- Don't require a rule if you will not enforce it.
- Don't lecture or shame based on past or present failures.
- Don't expect your child's emotional support (appreciation, respect, or understanding). Enjoy it when it comes, but don't NEED it.
- Don't immediately give her a car, phone, beepers, etc. as a reward for completing this program. The reward is COMING HOME. Pre-set a minimum time (three months, six months) that requires completion of measurable outcomes after coming home before considering any of the above. Always require some financial responsibility on her part. Remember children learn to feel entitled or they learn to be responsible.
- Don't reward whining—this should bring an automatic NO!
- Don't change your daughter's boundaries in order to grant a favor. Don't ask for other authority figures to grant you a favor by changing your daughter's boundaries. You are doing your daughter a favor by teaching her that the world does not revolve around her "special needs".
- Don't say, "Just do your best." Have a minimum standard.
- Don't act like a victim or treat your daughter like a victim.
- Don't compare her to others.

# WHEN YOUR DAUGHTER COMES HOME:

#### WHAT TO DO

- Provide structure. (She has been in a structured environment; it works.)
- Provide consistency, yes is yes, no is no. Followthrough, keep your word, and make the effort to enforce.
- Communicate. Ask questions caringly, not accusingly.
- Go to church.
- Use empathy and reality when correcting, then consequences. Empathize with her feelings without changing the boundary.
- Require certain standards of behavior—not because you need it, but because your daughter needs it.
- Get your emotional needs met from other people in your life instead of from your daughter.
- Spend time together, one on one, also as a family.
   Pay attention when your daughter is doing well.
   Don't wait for a crisis.
- Set goals, control resources, and manage consequences.
- Evaluate your own life and model boundaries.
- Practice honesty.
- When you are wrong, admit it, correct it, and move on. This will show your daughter what you want her to do when she messes up.
- Make decisions free from manipulation. Don't make decisions based on your emotions.
- Expect your daughter to test the limits. Be strong and encourage your daughter to apply the skills that she has been taught. Don't allow yourself to give in to feelings of discouragement.
- Be patient and allow repeated trials.
- Show confidence and look your child in the eye.
- Expect her to be responsible, she has been taught a lot.

#### 9. Obey your parents.

Colossians 3:20 Children, obey your parents in everything, for this pleases the Lord.

#### 10. Treat your parents with respect.

Ephesians 6:2a "Honor your father and mother."

#### 11. Obey teachers, coaches, and other trusted adults.

1 Peter 2:13 Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every authority instituted among men.

#### 12. Always speak cheerfully.

#### 16. Do not take revenge when you've been wronged. Get help from a parent.

#### 17. Don't talk back.

Proverbs 18:13 He who answers before listening—that is his folly and his shame.

#### 18. Have a happy heart.

Proverbs 15:30a A cheerful look brings joy to the heart.

#### 19. Forgive others.

Colossians 3:13 Bear with each other and forgive whatever grievances you may have against one another. Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

#### 20. Accept discipline with a good heart.

Proverbs 13:1 A wise son heeds his father's instruction, but a mocker does not listen to rebuke.

## **Basic Behavioral Standards**

#### Speech

- Don't talk back.
- Don't cuss.
- Don't use harsh words or euphemisms that take from God's glory (OMG, gees, holy guacamole etc.)
- Speak kindly.
- No yelling or screaming in the house.
- No uncontrolled yelling outside (out of respect for the neighbors)
- Don't call people names.
- Use people's preferred names.
- Use miss, missus, and mister with adults.
- Don't lie.
- Don't deceive.
- Answer politely when spoke to.
- Don't comment negatively about or to people.
- Don't tease and make fun of others.
- No squabbling.
- Do not complain.
- Do not argue.

#### **Behavior**

- Obey quickly, completely, and cheerfully.
- Obey the first time.
- Don't roll your eyes
- Don't run in the house.
- Don't throw things at others.
- Don't hit, kick, pinch, slap, or scratch.
- Don't take away from others.
- Don't burp loudly or impolitely.
- Don't interrupt.
- If you're not sure if something is a good idea, don't do it without asking permission.
- When your parents are not home, don't do anything you think they would disapprove of
- Have a cheerful countenance.
- Listen patiently.
- Knock before entering.
- If the bathroom door is shut and the light is on, wait patiently. Don't knock or start a conversation.
- No stealing (including candy and treats).
- Obey all authority unless the authority is asking you to do something inappropriate.
   This includes older siblings when appropriate.
- Children should say "Please" and "Thank you."

- Answer the phone with "Hello, this is the Smiths. Would you like to speak to my mom or my dad?"
- Introduce yourself when phoning others.
- No running or yelling at church, even after the service.
- Keep their room reasonably picked up.
- Help with household chores.
- Ask to be excused from the table. Otherwise stay in your seat.
- Replace the used roll of toilet paper.
- Take your plate to the sink and rinse it.
- Get up when your alarm goes off or someone wakes you up.
- Cover your mouth when you sneeze.
- Don't touch the curtains.
- Don't talk with food in your mouth.
- Hold doors open for others.
- If you open something, shut it.
- If you turn something on, shut it off.
- If you spill something, clean it up.
- If you borrow something, bring it back.
- If you get something out, put it away.
- Put your clothes in the hamper.
- Serve others in need.
- Don't ask to be first or to get the biggest piece.
- Don't gamble or make bets.
- Go out of your way to make younger children feel loved and appreciated.
- Don't go behind closed doors with adults and don't allow the younger kids to do so.
- Don't eat with your fingers unless it is finger food.
- Use a napkin not your shirt.
- Thank people when you leave their house.
- Little kids: Stay in bed. Keep your head on your pillow.
- Little kids: Don't touch outlets, plants, and Christmas ornaments.
- Go to bed on time. Not a minute late.
- Take care of your toys, possessions, and pets.
- Don't climb on the furniture.
- Don't get even. Ask for help.
- Don't open or read other's mail.
- Ask permission before leaving the house or inviting someone over.
- Don't scare people (very often ;-))
