FAITHFULNESS

CHARACTER

Overview:

Faithfulness is an area of our character in which we are called to be reliable or dependable with the resources, relationships and commitments which God has given us. When we've been entrusted with something, we will be called to give an account of how faithful we were with it. When we prove faithful, we will be entrusted with more. Whatever we are faithful to is a reflection of who and what is truly important to us. We should be faithful stewards of all that God has entrusted us with.

DISCIPLESHIP – PART 7 Have Clear Aims

Overview:

Once you choose someone to disciple, you need to have clear aims for that discipleship relationship. The bigger goal is to help people follow Jesus! Specifically, how are we going to do that? It boils down to two major categories: What people understand (or know) and How people live (or obey). In other words, their doctrine and life.

Outline:

I. Aims of Discipleship

A. Our Life AND Doctrine (1 Timothy 4:16)

- 1. This is a letter written from the Apostle Paul to his son in the faith, Timothy. Timothy is a leader and Paul is stating the key priorities are what you teach people and how you live your life. This potent combination will help Timothy in leading his church.
- 2. Life affects doctrine and doctrine affects life. Bad beliefs lead to bad behavior. Bad behavior leads to bad beliefs.
- B. **Our Doctrine** (Titus 1:16, Acts 2:42, 2 Timothy 2:15, Philippians 2:16)
- 1. We want the people we are discipling to be growing daily in their doctrine/knowledge of God. This happens through reading God's Word, listening to sermons, reading good Christian books and studying the Bible with other Christians in Small Groups.
- 2. It is an investment of time to grow in your Biblical knowledge (your doctrine). We pour much time into a variety of hobbies, social media, our phone, projects, etc. However, we can make deliberate decisions daily, weekly and monthly to grow in our knowledge of God and His Word (our doctrine).
- 3. People can't obey what they don't know. We must teach each other the Word of God. The Bible is clear about the importance of knowing God's Word.
- C. **Our Life** (2 Thessalonians 3:9, 1 Timothy 4:15, 1 John 2:29)
- 1. We want the people we are discipling to be living godly lives as well. Helping them obey what they have learned about God and His Word. We don't want our disciples to just have a head full of good doctrine without obedience.

We want them to live godly lives as well. To obey what they have learned.

- 2. We must be transparent. Fakery defeats discipleship. Invite people to learn from your mistakes and sins.
- 3. How do we impact people? By spending time with them.

2. **Conclusion** (Hebrews 13:7)

After we choose someone to disciple, we must have clear goals for our discipleship relationship. The two big goals are that they would honor Christ in their life and doctrine.

Discussion Question:

 "How is our Christian "continuing education" going? How can we make our life more imitable?"

Overview:

Marriage counseling is often requested of various leaders in the church from those who are close to them. By having a good understanding of the Word of God, and by using some basic listening skills and practices, God can use you to help strengthen marriages in the church.

I. Choose the best environment.

- 1. Decide whether to meet separately or together.
 - a. Separately:
 - To hear specific issues independently.
 - To encourage openness.
 - To rebuke.
 - b. Together:
 - To resolve discrepancies (keep both honest).
 - To observe interactions.
 - To begin working through specific issues together.
- 2. Note: When counseling people of the opposite sex, have your spouse present.
 - a. Your spouse does NOT need to be part of session.

II. Lay out some basic "ground rules."

- 1. Pray together. (Have them hold hands.)
- 2. Acknowledge: I am not a professional counselor.
 - a. But, I can share Biblical truths & principles that I believe will help your marriage.
- 3. Be clear on your expectations.
 - a. Goal: reconciliation rather than just "Winning a fight."
 - b. Never use the word "never" and always avoid "always."
 - c. You reserve the right to interrupt and correct.
- 4. Let them know you may need to get additional input and counsel from others (get their permission).
 - a. My pastors, counselor or professional.
 - b. My spouse will not know about these things unless you agree.

III. Identify central issues.

- 1. Have each person rate his or her marriage from
 - 1-10 (1=on verge of divorce, 10=on verge of bliss)
 - a. Do this independently of each other (Lock into number before sharing).
 - b. Write this down (date it).
- 2. Listen and ask, "How would you like to raise that number by 2-3 points?"
 - a. What would you be willing to give/change to make this happen? Is this what you want?
 - b. Are you willing to be humble, honest and open?

- 3. Ask each person, "What are the 1 or 2 most challenging issues/situations in your marriage?"
 - a. Things that bug you the most or can't forget.
 - b. Things that if your spouse changed, would make your marriage better... by 1-3 points?
- 4. Have them share these with spouse, one at a time.

IV. Work to resolve one or two key issues.

- 1. Have each person repeat what the "heard" their spouse just say.
 - a. If they get it wrong, ask them to repeat until satisfied.
- 2. If there was sin involved, walk them through steps of forgiveness.
 - a. Have them OWN their sin first. Confess it was wrong.
 - b. Hold hands & say: "I was wrong, will you forgive me?"
 - c. Spouse responds: "Yes, I forgive you."
- 3. Once forgiveness is granted, move on to restoration. Ask good questions (to both):
 - a. "Is what your spouse is asking something you can do or remedy?"
 - b. "How will you specifically do it?"
 - c. [To other spouse] "Is this acceptable to you?"
 - i. Write these things down for future reference.

V. Tips and considerations.

- 1. Make sure to pray with couple before and after.
- 2. Be open with you own life.
 - a. When appropriate, share how you have struggled.
- 3. Use the Bible.
 - 2 Timothy 3:16 NIV "All scripture is God-breathed and is useful..."
- 4. If you feel over your head, go "up line" for help.
 - a. Pastors, professional counselors, etc.
- 5. Give them ideas and practical resources.
 - a. Books, blogs, podcasts, memory verses, etc.
- 6. Set up a follow up time ... and follow up.
 - a. Email a summary of the meeting to both.
- 7. Always leave them with HOPE!

Conclusion:

By identifying the central issues and helping couples practically work through them in a Biblical fashion, you can make a huge difference in the marriages of those around you.
